



1. Welcome to the 2012 IFMAR World Championships.

Dear RC friends,

The Model Auto Club Heemstede is proud to present to you: The 2012 IFMAR World Championships for 1:10 and 1:12 scale electric on-road.

The MACH organized its first World Championship back in 1989. Lamberto Collari won here his first of an amazing 9 World Championship titles in 1:8 scale nitro on-road.

From 21st till 28th of July 2012 the elite in electric on-road racing will gather in the Netherlands to crown 2 new IFMAR World Champions, in 1:10 sedan and in 1:12 sports cars. Will Marc Rheinhard add a 4th IFMAR title to his laurels? Can Naoto Matsukura go for a 3rd consecutive title in 1:12? We don't know yet. But we do know that we will have the perfect stage set for these 2 World Championship events.

The MACH will prepare a world class stage for 1:12 scale at a top class venue in the city of Haarlem. The Kennemer Sports Centre will be the host for this event. A true r/c racing stadium will be built with grand stand accommodation for 500 spectators, enclosing the 20x30m carpet track area. The track design is tailored for 1:12 and is second to none. Designed to separate the men from the boys.

The rostrum complex features a 12m drivers rostrum, race control and technical inspection. The 10x50m drivers paddock will offer enough pit table space to accommodate up to 120 racers. Separate rooms are available for IFMAR and Team Manager Meetings, and to accommodate the press. High speed Wi-Fi internet is available for the print, web and internet TV media and will connect this event with the world.











And when we have celebrated the 1:12 World Champion the whole organization will move to the permanent track in Heemstede. IFMAR demanded to slow down top speed of the 1:10 scale as at this track the 120 km/h barrier would surely be broken. Hara already did 118 km/h at the ETS in 2009, just imagine the insane speeds these cars will reach in 2012. A special chicane has been added some 20m down the back straight which will slow the cars down as requested, but more importantly, will transform the MACH track in a very demanding 1:10 Worlds track.

Having organized the 2001 Euros and several ETS races the accommodation at the MACH is well known to many top racers,. A spacious rostrum with separate referee's area on the top deck, and race control and technical inspection at the ground floor. The huge scoreboard shows the positions of all 10 cars, and monitors around the pit area will let you follow all the racing on lap time detail.

We at MACH think we have set the stage for one of the best and biggest IFMAR Worlds in this class ever. This is the main event in 2012 and you don't want to miss it. BE THERE

5. Track and accommodation

5.1 Outdoor track

The permanent outdoor track is very suitable for IC track and electric racing. It is 285 meters long and 4.20 wide between the lines. It is a challenging track with fast and slow corners. A new chicane will be build into the track on the straight.

The track is approx. 280 meters long, 4 to 4.5 meters width, has a covered paddock for approx.120 drivers and is equipped with 220 volts. There is room to extend to 150 drivers.

Compressed air is available, and so is 12 volt under the driver's rostrum.

A driver's rostrum of 11 meters width, computerized lap counting and timing, a large scoreboard, and monitors to watch the results makes this track one of the finest in Europe.

















5.1.1 Other areas

The outdoor track has full range of service for the drivers, teams and spectators.

- Sufficient parking space near the track
- Restrooms and shower near the clubhouse
- Clubhouse with restaurant and variety of hot and cold drinks

5.1.2 Race control

Race control is located in the rostrum building. The rostrum itself can handle up to 15 drivers and 2 referees. The tower can be used for an additional referee. Timekeeping is situated below. Tech-control is situated next to the rostrum.

5.1.3 Pit Area

- Permanent covered pit area with 230 V supply
- Compressed air
- Monitors to supply the drivers and mechanics with race results and driver info
- Room for 120 drivers which can be extended to 150

5.2 Indoor Track

Since a few years we also run an indoor facility to accommodate the needs of our Electric drivers that look for entertainment in the winter period. The last indoor facility in an old Car Show Room has hosted the 1;12th indoor Spec European Championship in February 2009.

For the 2012 WC MACH has a sports center available with an area of 40x77 square meters. The 'Kennemer Sport center' which is located in the city of Haarlem, has plenty of parking spaces and is only a 15 minutes drive away of the outdoor track in Heemstede. Internet is available in both facilities to host online streaming.

Track lay-out is not yet defined. The picture shows a possible lay-out and gives a presentation of the available space in the venue.














9.1 Camping

Near the outdoor track there is enough room for camping and parking. We will set up a temporarily Toilet and Shower facility. There are also official camping's available within 10 km's of the track. A daily fee will be applicable for all people on the camping area near the outdoor track.









10. Recreation and sightseeing near Heemstede Swimming pool

For those staying on the camping, about 1 km from the track there is a swimming pool. Just cross the main road at the traffic light and after about 700 meters on the left side you will find an indoor swimming pool called Groenendaal at the Sportparklaan 16.

Zandvoort beach.

The Nord Sea beach is only about 10 km's away. Simply follow the signs Zandvoort and you will be on the beach within 20 minutes. Please be aware that all parking in Zandvoort near the beach is paid parking so do not forget to buy a ticket.

Amsterdam attractions throughout the city

Visitors arriving at Central Station usually drop their jaws at the sight of the multi-story 'bicycle flat', a parking structure used by thousands daily and the subject of many a photograph. From there, head south toward the always lively Dam Square, flanked by the Royal Palace and the Nieuwe Kerk (New Church) to the west and the National Monument, commemorating the victims of World War II, to the east.

Follow the bustling shopper's-haven Kalverstraat to the Spui, home to **weekly book and art markets**. Find the alley that leads to the <u>Begijnhof</u>, a peaceful **hidden courtyard** edged with charming homes of single women who pledge their time for religious service. There's also a tiny chapel worth visiting.



Attractions for young and old

Plenty of Amsterdam attractions cater to families with kids young and old. The **wax figures** of celebrities and heroes at <u>Madame Tussauds</u> will make you wonder, "How did they do that?" Or enjoy a terrifically creepy time in the <u>Amsterdam Dungeon</u>. Hands-on <u>science center NEMO</u> combines education, entertainment and **spectacular views of the city from its rooftop** (with an <u>urban beach</u> in summer). A life-size replica of <u>Dutch East India Company ship 'The Amsterdam'</u> is docked just outside. Amsterdam's zoo, Artis, is a year-round favourite for **animal-lovers**.

Welcome to Haarlem









Located about 20km from the capital city of Amsterdam, Haarlem is one of Holland's most attractive cities.

Known as the City of Flowers, it is a place of historical architecture, culture and outstanding modern facilities. Although situated at the heart of Holland's industrial region, Haarlem is also close to the coastal dunes and many areas of natural beauty, including the world-famous Dutch bulb fields.

Haarlem has a long and interesting history which befits a city which has already celebrated its 750th aniversary.

Haarlem has been the setting for many colourful and dramatic historical events not least of which the Spanish occupation in 1572. More recently, the German occupation formed the backdrop for some of the most gripping and heroic stories of Holland in WW2.











The Golden Age

Like other major Dutch towns, Haarlem saw conflict with the Spanish who had annexed the Low Countries, culminating in a seven-month siege of the town which started in late 1572. Ultimately, Haarlem surrendered but it was a punishing siege for the Spanish too, and they only stayed long enough to see the town sign a treaty agreeing to uphold certain religious (Catholic) principles, after which they left. Ironically, not long afterwards the town was granted all possessions of the Catholic church in Haarlem as compensation following one of



the several city fires which destroyed large parts of the town. As there were many abbeys and convents in Haarlem, this acquisition stood Haarlem in good financial stead.

The town saw the rise (and fall) of various industries as the city elders sought to develop the town in the 16th and 17th centuries, the Golden Age of the Low Countries. Textiles, and street names. The once-famous city defenses, in the form of walls, ramparts, gatehouses and look-out towers, have largely disappeared but remnants, like the Amsterdamse Poort, do still survive and the magnificent cathedral on the main square is testimony to the power and financial clout once enjoyed by Haarlem.

Amsterdamse Poort

This small gatehouse stands well east of the town centre on the old road to Amsterdam, its slender, Disney-esque towers an unexpected visual treat in a part of town otherwise dominated by the works depot of the national Dutch rail company.





It is the last remnant of Haarlem's mediaeval defensive ramparts, the other gatehouses having disappeared one by one over the centuries. Originally built in 1355, it has survived against all odds. By the mid-19th century, it was so dilapidated that only a lack of money prevented immediate demolition. Salvation came when it was decided to use it to store munitions from another city gate which had been pulled down. Minor repairs followed at the end of the 19th century but it was not fully renovated until 1985. It had already been declared a listed building in the 1960's.

The Amsterdamse Poort may look a bit of an anomaly nowadays but a reminder of how important it once was is given by a small sculpture nearby, depicting citizens of Haarlem looking up to it in awe and gratitude. Present-day visitors can walk under and through the gatehouse but the interior is not open to the public.

11. Warm-Up Race.

The chicane on the main straight will be built in October/November 2011. A Warm-Up race will be held in May, early June 2012. Dates will be confirmed during this winter.
